1 About the ECTP and the Young Planners Workshop

The ECTP-CEU (European Council of Spatial Planners – Conseil Européen des Urbanistes), founded in 1985, brings together 40.000 spatial planners with 27 professional town planning associations and institutes from 25 European countries.

It is an umbrella association providing its members with a common framework for planning practice, planning education, continuing professional development and the definition of professional responsibilities.

ECTP-CEU sets standards of education and conduct for the planning profession; identifies, celebrates and rewards examples of good planning all over Europe; and engages in dialogue with local, national and European governments.

In accordance with these objectives, the initiative of the Young Planners Workshop seeks to set out young planners' perspectives and experiences within the context of new European paradigms.

2 Project Description

Future of the Traces of Modernity: Public Mass Housing Neighbourhoods

Housing in European cities, especially in its central and eastern part, was developed as mass-housing based on denying the principles of street and places — the basic structures forming the city. Due to socio-economical changes, these residential city parts are facing massive pressure to be redesigned and redeveloped. As for they are not new — fresh developed city parts based on green land — but already inhabited and functional parts of the city, it is not easy to find the ways of transformation as well as the vision, how they should be transformed.

The theme is dived into two parts:

- Urban development philosophy;
- Practical ways of planning methods how to achieve it.

The workshop will be focused on finding the vision and the goals to be reached in the first step and then — according to the spatial requirements of the vision — setting the rules and

tools of spatial planning how to reach them.

The vision should include current principles of city planning, social inclusion, ecological and economic sustainability.

Principles of city planning

- Integration of urban functions and services, such as housing, work and leisure
- Pedestrian and cyclists are priority
- Design of public spaces

Social inclusion

- Mixed structure of inhabitants (different housing needs)
- Involvement of citizens and inhabitants, public participation

Ecological principles

- Rainwater management
- Heat island minimalization
- Natural parks and encalves

Economic principles

- Value for money
- Commercial and public activities
- Community planning

Participants of the workshop should use local areas based on exact needs and local conditions.

3 Rules for Admission: Abstract

Projects are led, carried out and presented by young people aged less than **35 years**.

What to include:

Projects can be presented by **individual** submission or by **groups** of up to 3 participants maximum.

Submissions must include:

- names of participants;
- current professional situation;
- short biography up to 100 words;
- e-mail:
- abstract up to 300 words including figures.

- Guidelines for abstracts:
- Title, abstract of no more than 300 words maximum, up to 6 keywords, only in English;
- Ms Word format, font and size is Arial 10, no images, do not use any footnotes, reference format 'Harvard style', figures added as self-standing attachments.

Through the submission, the participants are granting the ECTP-CEU the authors' rights and full permission to publish abstracts.

4 Rules for Papers: Final Presentation

The final presentation consists in a written paper and a poster with one or two pages. The texts of the papers of each group,

along with explanatory graphical elements (maps, schemes, photos), are then put into a landscape oriented ISO-A4 booklet. Additional information to those listed hereafter will be provided during the workshop sessions.

4.1 Papers

Papers for final presentations will have to meet the following requirements:

General: Author's name, affiliation and contact at the

beginning.

Papers should not exceed 12 Pages, that is approximately 4000 words, including figures, abstract and references (which should number

not more than 50).

Language: English; please use common British (UK) Eng-

lish spelling with -ise.

File Format: Microsoft Word.

Filename: Author's or group leader's surname.

Font Size: Arial 10.

Line Spacing: Multiple 1,15

Paragraphs: Formatting with no spacing before or after and

no justification.

Limit the text to two levels at the most (Sec-

opt the following style.

Sections: 1 Introduction, 2 ... 3 ... etc. Sub-sections: 1.1, 1.2 ... 2.1, 2.2 ... etc.

References: Harvard Style.

All submissions are made in electronic form.

4.2 Poster

Dimensions: ISO-B1 (707 mm × 1000 mm) portrait.

Number: one (1) or two (2) posters.

File format: PDF.

Resolution: 250 dpi for raster elements.

4.3 Booklet

Dimensions: ISO-A3 (297 mm \times 210 mm) landscape.

Text: Two columns.

Graphic parts: Schemes, plans, local views.
